Pratt Fine Arts Center offers beginning through advanced level classes and workshops in a variety of disciplines including painting, drawing and printmaking. Pratt's drawing courses cover various facets of exploration; techniques and tools are explored, as well as special topics such as cartooning, ink drawing, and children's book illustration. Pratt's well-equipped printmaking studio offers classes in a variety of processes including screenprinting, monotype and collograph, letterpress, drypoint, block printing and intaglio etching. As a non-accredited education center, Pratt's classes are open to everyone.



The Pratt Hallway Gallery, which is located just inside the main entrance of Building 1, showcases the artwork of Pratt instructors, students, and renters, demonstrating the quality, strength and range of talent that is cultivated and made possible by programs offered at Pratt Fine Arts Center.
